The Season of Creation is an annual celebration of prayer, reflection, education and action to protect creation. This liturgical season is celebrated by Christians of all traditions through prayer services and advocacy projects.

The season begins September 1, the Day of Prayer for Creation, and runs through October 4, the Feast of St. Francis, who is the patron saint of ecology in many traditions.

This year there is especially urgent need to pray and act on behalf of the earth as we heed the report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change that came out a year ago. The world's leading climate scientists have warned there is only a dozen years for global warming to be kept to a maximum of 1.5C, beyond which even half a degree will significantly worsen the risks of drought, floods, extreme heat and poverty for hundreds of millions of people. The world is already experiencing the deadly consequences of global warming through bigger storms, more fires and severe drought.

This year our theme is **GOD'S VOICE IN CREATION: What is Creation saying** to us?

We will be reading texts from the prophet Jeremiah to reflect on God's presence and our role as faithful Christians in the climate change crisis. Together we will learn about the impact of single use plastic and practice other ways of carrying, collecting and organizing our food and other goods. We will lean on our faith and trust in our God as we garner strength and hope in the face of impending destruction of our beautiful earth.

SAY NO TO TAKE-OUT STYROFOAM

Even though styrofoam packaging has a recycle stamp on it, styrofoam takeout containers, electronics packaging and coolers are more likely to end up in landfills or polluting our waterways. Styrofoam is difficult and costly to recycle partly because of its production method and partly because styrofoam that has been contaminated by food cannot be safely recycled. So the recycling market is diminishing.

The world's landfills contain 25-30% styrofoam. Once in the landfill styrofoam can take centuries to break down because it is not sensitive to light. Once in the waterways sea animals eat it and either die or pass on its toxins to the people who eat the seafood.

Styrofoam is a carcinogen when heated with a hot drink or hot food. It is produced from oil and its production process contributes to global warming. The good news: Many cities worldwide have banned styrofoam including Toronto. Support your city in banning styrofoam.

Refuse to use styrofoam for takeout. Keep a glass or reusable plastic container in your car to use when you go to a takeout restaurant or deli.

FROZEN APPLE PIES – PIE MAKING BEE & SALES

Once again it is time to start thinking about our Apple Pie project. Each year for around 30 years we have been making apple pies and selling them as "We make them, you bake them".

This is a very rewarding project. Not only is it a large fund raising project but also a "fun" raising project. It is an opportunity to renew old friendships and make new ones. We share jokes, stories, laughter and yes maybe some tears.

WE DESPERATELY NEED HELP. You do not have to have any experience. There are many places where one can help—making pastry, rolling pastry, filling pies, putting lids on them, filling the freezer, washing apples, cutting and peeling apples. Making coffee for us (very important!!) or organizing us.

First of all we need the apples. The more we get donated or at a reasonable price the more profit we make. Check out your friends and neighbours. If they have apple trees ask if they would donate some of the extras to us. We invite the donations of flour, sugar, cinnamon and cornstarch. Best places to buy at reasonable prices are No Frills and Superstore (use your shopping cards) and Costco. Mary Wilson will do the shopping if you donate cash.

We meet Tuesday mornings from 9-11:30am and Thursday evenings from 7-9:30pm. You can come for an hour or two or the whole session. Every little bit helps.

Don't forget that orders are important. If you can get some orders for us that is just as important as making the pies!!

Remember that no experience is necessary. There is a place for all. MEN ARE MOST WELCOME. DON'T BE SHY!!

We generally start towards the end of September and go till we run out of ingredients, orders or energy!
